fun to the youngster, and being large enough to hold several packages, will be utilized by mother in sending her young chauffeur to the grocery and on other errands.

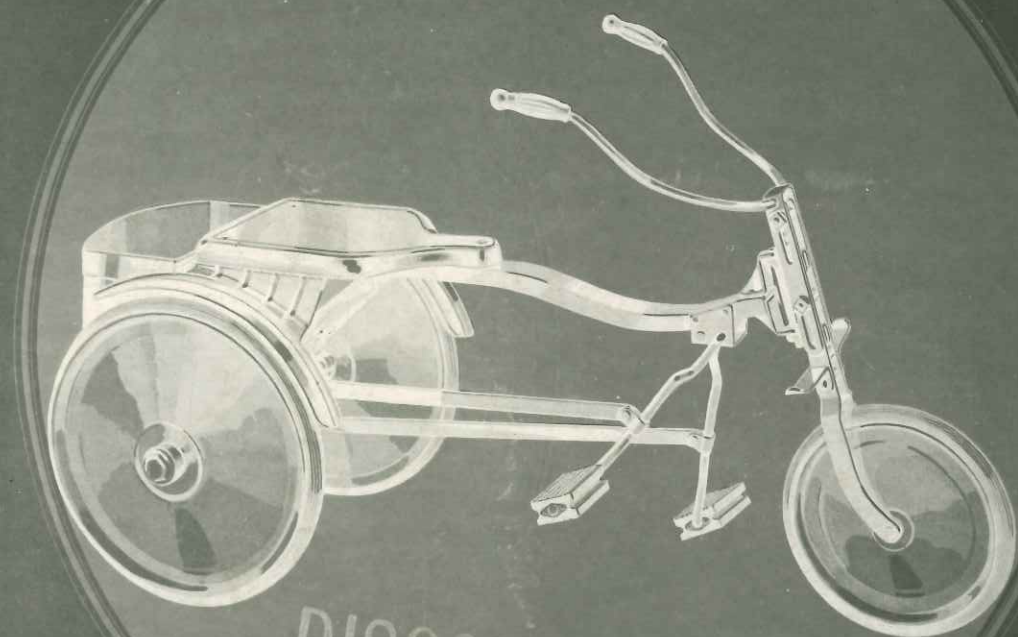
